

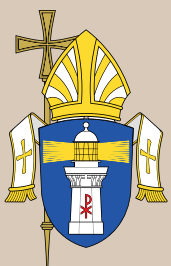

TO THE CLERGY AND LAY

The Jubilee Year 2025 calls us to rediscover the centrality of Jesus Christ in our lives and to deepen our relationship with Him, not as a distant figure, but as the Door through which we enter into the fullness of life. As the community of the Church in Broken Bay, our mission, then, is to open that door to all, inviting everyone into the embrace of Jesus, experience His saving mercy, and know His transformative love.

This means that we have the unique opportunity, as “Pilgrims of Hope,” to discover anew our own roles as workers in Christ’s vineyard. Renewed by the grace of the Holy Year, we take up the challenge to evangelise with hope and vigour, offering a witness to all the ends of the earth of the living Gospel. 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Meet the Official Jubilee Mascot: "Luce"

The Dicastery for Evangelisation commissioned an anime artist to develop a mascot for the Holy Year. "Luce" means "Light" and the character combines symbolic elements including the World Mission Rosary (originally designed by Bishop Fulton Sheen), and Camino shells in her eyes as a nod to the world's most famous pilgrimage, the Camino de Santiago. The muddy boots, the staff and the yellow raincoat are symbolic of remaining faithful and connected to the Church, and to Jesus the Vine, on the pilgrimage towards Heaven through all of life's storms: the yellow of the coat and the blue of Luce's hair are intended to incorporate the colours of the Vatican Flag.



QUICK GUIDE TO THE ORDINARY JUBILEE 2025

WHAT IS A JUBILEE YEAR?

According to Judaic tradition, the fields would lie fallow for a 'Sabbath Year' after 6 years of labour. Every seventh Sabbath Year was followed by a Jubilee (50 years), during which slaves were released, commercial debts were cancelled, and property was returned to its original owners. This became a year of honouring God.

In the Catholic Tradition, Jubilees are now celebrated every 25 years. Jubilees are a year of pilgrimage, thanksgiving, and repentance - it is a year for seeking and giving forgiveness. Each Jubilee is formally announced with a document, known as a Papal Bull. This Jubilee the Papal Bull is Titled:

Spes Non Confundit - Hope does not disappoint.

KEY THEMES FROM PAPAL BULL. SPES NON CONFUNDIT

Forgive debts & give pardons

Pope Francis extends a "heartfelt appeal" to affluent nations, asking them to "acknowledge the gravity of so many of their past decisions and determine to forgive the debts of countries that will never be able to repay them." This includes "ecological debt" as addressed in Laudato Si, and the pardon of prisoners.

Peace for a Suffering World

Calling for a year of hope and patience in the face of much suffering in the world, Pope Francis "dreams that arms may fall silent", encouraging diplomacy to end war and a "global fund" to put an end to hunger, rather than financing weapons.

Pilgrimage

Pope Francis hopes that the itineraries and pilgrimages planned during the Jubilee Year are "oases of spirituality and places of rest on the pilgrimage of faith", and that shrines may also be places "for the rebirth of hope."

Pilgrimages including a 'holy door' like that at St Peter's Basilica, may obtain an indulgence.

Hope for the future

Pope Francis highlights his concern for declining birth rates, stating various reasons, including frenetic pace of life, fears about the future, lack of job security, and adequate social policies. With this he also mentions his concerns for young people, stating they are the rising generation, and we must not disappoint them.

Christian Unity

Jubilee Year is an opportunity to focus on Christian unity and dialogue. 2025 will be the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea. Pope Francis calls for continued work in Ecumenical dialogue, in the of hope agreeing on a common date for Easter for Catholics and Orthodox. Coincidentally Easter will be celebrated on the same day in 2025.

DECREE ON THE GRANTING OF INDULGENCES DURING THE JUBILEE YEAR 2025

All the faithful, are eligible to receive a plenary indulgence if they:

- are truly repentant and free from any affection for sin
- are moved by a spirit of charity
- are purified through the sacrament of penance and refreshed by Holy Communion, and
- pray for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff.

An indulgence can be obtained in the following ways:



Pilgrimage to Sacred Sites

The faithful, pilgrims of hope, will be able to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence granted by the Holy Father if they undertake a pious pilgrimage:

- To any Sacred Jubilee Site, and devoutly participating in Mass, or other liturgical rites*
- in Rome, by visiting at least one of the four Major Papal Basilicas.*
- in the Holy Land, by visiting one of three basilicas.*
- in other ecclesiastical areas as designated by a local ordinary.*

Visits to Sacred Places

Likewise, the faithful can obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if, individually or in a group, they devoutly visit any Jubilee site, as designated by local Bishop's, and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in prayer, via planned rituals.

Each Diocese will nominate Jubilee sites, in the lead up to the opening of Jubilee Year.

Those who cannot participate due to serious reasons, can obtain indulgence via a spiritual pilgrimage.

Works of Mercy & Penance

In addition, the faithful will be able to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if, with a devout spirit, they participate in popular missions, spiritual exercises, or formation activities on the documents of the Second Vatican Council and the Catechism of the Catholic Church, held in a church or other suitable place, according to the mind of the Holy Father.

The faithful are able to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence if they visit, for an appropriate amount of time, those in need.

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

All priests are encouraged to offer generous availability and self-dedication to allow the greatest possible opportunity for the faithful to benefit from the means of salvation, by making available and publishing time slots for confession, planning penitential celebrations, and making the widest possible use of retired priests who do not have other defined pastoral roles.

A Diocese may choose to appoint Clergy with the special task of promoting and administering the Sacrament of Penance during the Jubilee Year.

DIOCESAN SHRINES OF HOPE MAP

The Diocese of Broken Bay had 2 special shrines already, prior to the Jubilee Year. The Shrine of John Paul II in Gosford has been designated by Bishop Anthony as the Shrine of Hope for the Family, and the Shrine of Carlo Acutis in Chatswood has been designated by Bishop Anthony to be the Shrine of Hope for Young People.

For the Jubilee Year only, there will be a special Shrine of Hope for Priests & Vocations, under the patronage of St John Vianney. This Shrine will be installed in a special ceremony on Sunday 2nd March, 2025, at Mary Immaculate, Manly. From then until the end of the Jubilee Year, Pilgrims will be able to visit, to venerate the relic of St John Vianney and to pray for our priests, and for more vocations to the priesthood and religious life.



BROKEN BAY PILGRIM PASSPORT



A RECORD OF YOUR PILGRIMAGE

In much the same way as the famous Camino de Santiago pilgrimage has a passport that can be stamped along the way, you can get your Passport stamped at the Cathedral and the 3 Shrines of Hope.

Various organised walks and processions will occur throughout the Jubilee Year, and there is also a place to record any of these walks that you attend. All those who visit the Cathedral and all 3 Shrines of Hope can receive a certificate of completion.

You can get your Pilgrim Passport at your local parish office, and there is a little document wallet at the back of this prayer resource journal so you have somewhere safe to keep it.



DID YOU KNOW?

In 2025 the Christian Churches will celebrate Easter on the same day! Most years, there are different dates for Easter because the Roman Catholic and most Eastern Catholic churches, along with most Protestant churches, take the Gregorian Calendar as their basis for calculating the Easter date, whereas the Orthodox churches and some Eastern Catholic and Protestant churches have retained the Julian Calendar.

In the Jubilee Year of 2025, both calendars providentially align!

- pray St Ignatius' “Anima Christi”
- use some of the “hope” reflection aids in this booklet (*pp 13-14*)
- reflect on one of the bible quotes on the journalling pages (*pp 20-26*)
- write down thoughts or prayers that occur to you in the journalling pages
- pray some or all of the rosary
- read a little from the Gospels
- list all the things you're grateful for; thank Him for each, one by one
- just sit and look at Him, trusting that He is looking back at you! It's ok to “zone out” just sit and rest awhile with Him





HOW TO MAKE

JUBILEE INDULGENCE

The faithful, pilgrims of hope, will be able to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence granted by the Holy Father if they undertake a pious pilgrimage to any Sacred Jubilee Site.

Any Catholic can receive the Jubilee indulgence by visiting one of our three Shrines of Hope, if they also:

- 1. have the general intention to receive the indulgence**
- 2. receive sacrament of penance, and receive the Eucharist ¹**
- 3. pray for the intentions of the Pope (usually 1 Our Father and 1 Hail Mary)**
- 4. are detached from sin of any kind ²**

1 one confession suffices for several indulgences on the days either before or after the confession. You need to receive the Eucharist separately for each indulgence.

2. this one is really hard! Most of us are still attached in some way to small sins or sinful habits - but the good news is that even if you aren't perfectly detached in the inmost depth of your heart, you still obtain a Partial Indulgence, in accord with God's knowledge of your desire to please Him.

THE MOST OUT OF YOUR SHRINE VISIT



VENERATE THE RELICS

At each Shrine of Hope, there is a relic of the patron saint of that shrine - at Chatswood there is a relic of Carlo Acutis; at Gosford, there are relics of St John Paul II; and at Manly, there is a relic of St John Vianney. A visit to the Shrine allows you to pray for the intercession of that Saint, and to venerate the relic.

When we “venerate” a relic, it is important to understand that this is not the same as worship!

Worship is for God alone.

When we venerate a relic we are honouring the memory of the saint, and celebrating the extent to which they lived a life that signposted the love of Jesus, and modelled that for us in their relatable states of life.

We ask for their prayers for us as we seek to grow in love for the Lord and for the people around us.



The (*first class*) relics at our Shrines are fragments from the human remains of each saint. A *second class* relic is a fragment of something that belonged to the saint during their life on earth, eg. a piece of one of their garments. A *third class* relic is something that has been touched to the remains of the saint.

We treasure these objects in much the same way as you might treasure something that belonged to a deceased relative, or in the way that a mother may treasure the locks taken from her child’s first haircut! A physical object can help to connect us to the memory of that saint, who in life was a living member of the Body of Christ, and a temple of the Holy Spirit.

SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

If it has been a while since your last confession, not to worry! We’ve got you! Here is a reminder on what to expect and how to get the most out of it - and if you’re considering this now, you’re right on time: a Jubilee Year is all about renewing and reconnecting with God. Be encouraged!

BEFORE YOU GO

Take a few minutes to sit with God and reflect upon areas where you might not have failed to honour God in your choices - an “examination of conscience.”



A VERY BRIEF EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

My Relationship with God

Have I taken steps to help me grow closer to God? Do I love or esteem people or things above God? Have I faithfully attended Sunday Masses? Do I let God into my daily life, including prayer or getting to know Jesus by reading the Bible? Do I honour God, using his name with reverence?

Myself & Others

Have I shown love & respect for myself, God’s good creation?
Have I set a good example through my words or actions?
Am I faithful and loving in my relationships?
Do I speak of others with kindness and
Do I judge the motives of others?
Do I forgive?
Do I pray for the needs of myself and
Do I insist on getting my own way?
Do I respect others?
Have I taken or damaged anything that did not belong to me?
Was I envious of someone else? Have I cheated or lied?
Do I promote and support life in all its stages?


THE RITE OF PENANCE

1. Priest gives a blessing or greeting.
2. Make the Sign of the Cross and say “Bless me father, for I have sinned. My last confession was...” (weeks, months, or years).
3. Confess all your sins to the priest. (If you are unsure or uneasy, the priest will guide you.)
4. The priest assigns a penance and offers advice to help you live more faithfully in a manner worth of your Baptism.
5. Say an Act of Contrition, expressing your sorrow for your sins.
 (“O my God, I am very sorry that I have sinned against you, because you are so good, and with your help I will not sin again. Amen.”)
6. The priest, acting in the person of Christ, then absolves you from your sins.

AFTER ABSOLUTION

Doing the assigned penance will help you in your relationship with God and others - try to do it as soon as possible after confession so that you don’t forget... and then... Give thanks!! God’s love and mercy for you endures forever!

THE CATECHISM ON HOPE

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) is a rich resource that pulls together teaching from the Bible along with centuries of teaching from the Church Fathers and other saints... and organises it in one place, topic by topic. The Church's basic teachings on hope are drawn from the Book of Genesis, the Gospel of Matthew, several New Testament letters (Romans, 1 Thessalonians, Hebrews, Timothy, Titus), the Council of Trent and the writing of St Teresa of Avila. Each point is numbered, and serves as a tool for both reflection and learning.



It can be so very easy to let our eyes just rush across the words and not really take it in. For that reason, here is a Jubilee Challenge for you:

- *set aside 5 minutes in a quiet place. Inside a church is great, but in the rush of real life, it might be on the train if you're a student or worker, or perhaps after the kids are in bed one night if you're a parent.*
- *Take one of the Catechism extracts below - just one - and read it slowly... then re-read it.*
- *Right here in your book, highlight or underline anything that stood out to you.*
- *Spend a minute or two in prayer, asking God to strengthen and enrich your understanding of "hope" based on what you just read, asking Him also to strength and increase your own hope. Then... return to your daily activity, and trust that He will answer your prayer!*

Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit. **(c.f. CCC 1817)**

The virtue of hope responds to the aspiration to happiness which God has placed in the heart of every person; it takes up the hopes that inspire our activities and purifies them so as to order them to the kingdom of heaven; it keeps us from discouragement. **(c.f. CCC 1818)**

Hope sustains us during times that we feel abandoned; it opens up our hearts in expectation of eternal beatitude. Buoyed up by hope, we are preserved from selfishness and led to the happiness that flows from charity. **(c.f. CCC 1818)**

Hope is also a weapon that protects us in the struggle of salvation. **(c.f. 1820)**

Christian hope takes up and fulfills the hope of the chosen people which has its origin and model in the hope of Abraham, who was blessed abundantly by the promises of God fulfilled in Isaac, and who was purified by the test of the sacrifice."Hoping against hope, he believed, and thus became the father of many nations." **(c.f. CCC 1819)**

Christian hope unfolds from the beginning of Jesus' preaching in the proclamation of the beatitudes. the beatitudes raise our hope toward heaven as the new Promised Land; they trace the path that leads through the trials that await the disciples of Jesus. But through the merits of Jesus Christ and of his Passion, God keeps us in the "hope that does not disappoint." **(c.f. CCC 1820)**

Hope is expressed and nourished in prayer, especially in the Our Father, the summary of everything that hope leads us to desire. **(c.f. CCC 1820)**
